An African Adventure

Who could imagine it would be possible to go on a safari without leaving Sequim? John and Cecelia Werner made it happen on Saturday evening, March 9, with a photographic journey for almost 70 attendees in the Sequim Adventist Church fellowship room. The entryway to the event contained the small-scale replica of a native reed hut, illuminated in the darkness by electric candles. A gorilla and monkey perched on the roof to greet anyone courageous enough to enter the



event. Beyond the hut, the fellowship room dining tables were decorated with hippos, elephants, giraffes, and a variety of bugs. Small huts also occupied space in the center of each table along with baskets of nuts and mints. Large panoramic African landscapes hung from the walls at the sides of the room. The scent of freshly popped corn filled the air. The program began with a short vesper's worship message about the biblical character, Caleb, provided by Pastor Mark. Following vespers, a short presentation was provided by Rick Serns, one of our attending guests, about the SAGE organization and its opportunities for active seniors interested in short-term mission trips. Rick described activities such as church and school building projects in various locations around the world.

Once Pastor Mark introduced John and Cecelia Werner, all those in attendance were transported visually to the deserts of Africa. We saw pictures of those who had traveled to the medical clinic where John and Cecelia treated them for a variety of diseases and injuries. Many natives had traveled long distances to receive relief from their medical conditions. The Werners described the challenges and difficulties of being located in such a remote area from essential supplies such as

medicines, adequate amounts of food, and services for the maintenance and repair of equipment.

During the program, the Pathfinders served attendees at each table with dessert torts featuring three flavors: lemon, pistachio, or chocolate.

The photographic portion of the program concluded with an opportunity for those in attendance to ask Werners specific questions about their experiences in Africa. This event would not have been possible without the generous help of many individuals such as Jay Richmond's announcements and church foyer poster, Terri Durham's and Donna Wood's kitchen assistance, Karen Iverson's sound system operation, Twyla Luke's leadership of the Pathfinder group, the social committee member's decorative work and food preparation, and the use of Eloise Gatchet's kitchen carts. Our Sequim church is blessed to have members such as John and Cecelia Werner who were willing to prepare a fascinating presentation of their missionary journey to a place very few of





thanks to them for their years of service in a land so far away and so much in need of the medical help they were able to provide.
